Museum underway

Historical Association receives key to manse

With the acceptance of keys to the Presbyterian Manse, Thursday, Nov. 7, the Historical Association of Gouverneur moved one step closer to its goal of a "museum by '76". The purchase of the 11-room marble trimmed brick structure culminates a fund-raising effort of over a year.

The key to the structure, which was built in 1904, was presented by Rev. George Cox, pastor of First Presbyterian Church, to Harold A. Storie, town historian. Also present were Eugenia Huntress, president of Gouverneur Historical Association; Nelson Winters, association director and village historian; Miss Margaret Nulty, secretary-treasurer; Mrs. Helen Walrath, museum fund treasurer; and Charles Graves, president of Gouverneur Savings and Loan Association, financial consultant.

The association was organized in 1960, and efforts were made in ensuing years to obtain a suitable building for a museum. In early 1973, a fund drive to raise \$50,000 was started, and to date nearly \$25,000 has been collected through individual and corporate gifts, memorial gifts, a craft fair for two successive years, tag days and membership drives. Approximately the same amount will be needed for necessary renovations and maintenance. A sum of \$8,000 has been borrowed to complete payment to the Presbyterian Church and leave a working balance for immediate needs.

The work of moving miscellaneous artifacts into the museum has begun, and it is expected that work of cataloging, evaluating and placement of articles will not be finished until late next summer, although the formal dedication will not take place until 1976 as part of the local celebration of the Bicentennial.

Articles which have been donated for the museum have been recorded and stored by Harold Storie, who has had to build an addition to his garage to handle them. Some pictures, maps, etc. are in custody of the village.

Mrs. Huntress said Thursday that the former manse is in good condition.

Order retains TV channel 9

has written to the Tribune Press in an effort to clarify the corporation's position in requesting a 25 cent monthly rate increase in Cable TV rates.

The letter, postmarked Archibald, Ohio, and dated Nov. 4, 1974, read as follows:

Dear Sir:

"If I may, I should like to try and clear up some of the apparent misunderstanding, rumor, confusion, and even dissension resulting from our simple request for a twenty-five cent monthly rate raise for Cable TV service in Gouverneur. The facts, as I know them, are:

"1— On or about August 2, 1974, we received notice that beginning Sept. 1 the charge

of microwave transmission of three channels to our head end would be increased by 25 per cent (\$330). Eastern Microwave, Inc. is the common carrier and the F.C.C. had approved the increase.

"2— Later in the month, Community Antenna, Inc. requested the Gouverneur Village Board approve the above 25 cent raise, as specified in their franchise and, since a public hearing is required, also requested that a hearing date be set.

"3— The board complied by slating a hearing in early October. I was unable to attend the hearing but a representative was present. I have been advised that 13 or

WIGS AM-FM radio has new owners

Live broadcasts of village board meetings, beginning with that of Monday, Nov. 18, is but one of the innovations planned for radio station WIGS AM-FM, by the new owners, Robert and Romayne Hartshorn, stockholders of DeHart Broadcasting Corp. With approval of Federal Communications Commission, Washington, D.C., the station changed ownership on Friday, Nov. 1.

WIGS was opened 10 years ago and has been owned and operated by Genkar, headed by Morris F. and Anne Genther. The Genthers have purchased an AM radio station at Bath, and an FM station at Hammondsport. At present they are commuting from Gouverneur to operate these stations.

Mr. Hartshorn, formerly of Elkton, Md., has been affiliated with radio station WILM, Wilmington, De. He and his wife, and three month old son, Robert Henry, live in Bigelow. Mrs. Hartshorn is Ricville and East Side elementary school librarian. With the objective of getting a more informed com-

munity, Mr. Hartshorn is planning shows with more audience participation. He hopes to run station promotions with cooperation of merchants.

Also, Country music is not being discontinued, Mr. Hartshorn said, but is being mixed in with a variety of music throughout the day, rather than being in a certain time slot.

Much of the staff remains the same. Mark Holland, "Marcus D.", is production manager. He opens the station at 6 and is on the air until 9 a.m. A native of Winthrop, Mark is a graduate of Canton ATC. He is not married.

From 9 until 1 p.m., Glen Augustus, who has been with the station five years, takes over. Glen is from Watertown and is the program director.

Jack Wolak, music director, has the 1 to 6 p.m. shift. Formerly of Utica, Jack and his wife, Paula, and two children live at Brassie Corners.

Mike arrived two weeks ago from Scarsdale. He is a graduate of New York Institute of Technology with a BFA degree. Bachelor Mike is on the air from 5 until closing time at 11 p.m.

Sharon is a graduate of Gouverneur Central Schools and Southwest Tech.

On Sunday, Al Carfora is heard from 6 a.m. to noon, and Robert Rusch is in the

control room from then until 11 p.m.

Before the end of the year, a full time news man, Bill Jackson, Syracuse and graduate of Canton ATC, will be added to the team.

Town to purchase building for barn

At a public hearing called Nov. 7, it was voted by the town board to purchase the Rite Equipment building for use as a town barn.

The property includes six acres on the north side of route 11, at a cost of \$16,000 and the existing buildings at estimated cost of \$62,000.

The resolution adopted by the town board authorized the issuance of \$78,000 serial bonds of the Town of Gouverneur, to finance the

appropriation. According to Don Compo, town supervisor, eventually all the highway department and town offices will be located in the new town barn.

At the regular meeting of the board on Oct. 9 the town board instructed Don Compo to negotiate with Cives Corporation for the purchase of the building, as the present town barn on Depot Street is not adequate and cannot be repaired.
