CALVIN MITCHELL.

Dekalb Junction, March 3.—On Monday, Feb. 23rd, at his late home on Greene street, occurred the death of Calvin Mitchell, after an illness extending over several years. Mr. Mitchell was born October 30, 1838, in the town of Gouverneur, the son of Hiram and Sally Mitchell. He served his country for three years and nine months, enlisting in Battery D, First New York Light Artillery, under Capt. George B. Winslow and participated in 27 battles. He returned in 1866 to Richville and on January 1, 1867, he was united in marriage with Miss Dorothea Holland. They resided on their farm in Richville and by their industry and honesty prospered. In 1910 they purchased the Hyland residence on Greene street and moved into the village. Mr. Mitchell was a member of the Methodist church for a great many years and was an active and faithful member until incapacitated by the condition of his health. He was a charter member of the George A. Rich Post No. 468 and has been one of their strongest members. During his illness he was most tenderly and patiently cared for by his wife and daughters. The funeral, conducted by Rev. Mr. Summers of the M. E. church, was held from the family residence Wednesday and was largely attended by sympathizing friends and neighbors. Interment was made at Richville. Besides his widow Mr. Mitchell is survived by two daughters, Beulah and Ethel, and two sons, Vernon C. of Richville and Dexter of Moronoco, Mass.
